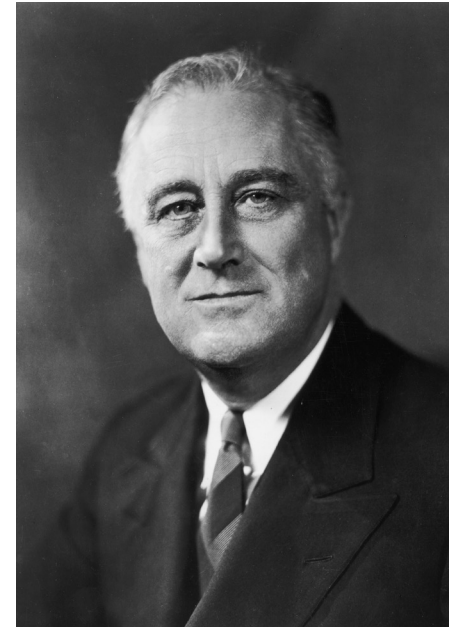

## Franklin Delano Roosevelt

Franklin Delano Roosevelt was the 32nd President of the United States.

Franklin Roosevelt was the longest serving president in U.S. history. He was elected president four times, and he served from 1933 – 1945.

In 1945, Franklin died during his fourth term as President of the United States.



## The 22nd Amendment

In 1951 the 22nd Amendment was added to the U.S. Constitution. This was six years after Franklin Roosevelt died.

**An amendment is a change to the Constitution.**

The 22nd Amendment says that no one can be elected President of the United State more than two times.

## The Great Depression

**Franklin Roosevelt was President during the Great Depression.**

When Franklin Roosevelt started his first term in 1933, the United States was in the middle of the Great Depression.

During the Great Depression, it was hard for people to make money. Many people lost their jobs and their homes. A lot of people had to stand in long lines for bread just so they could have something to eat.

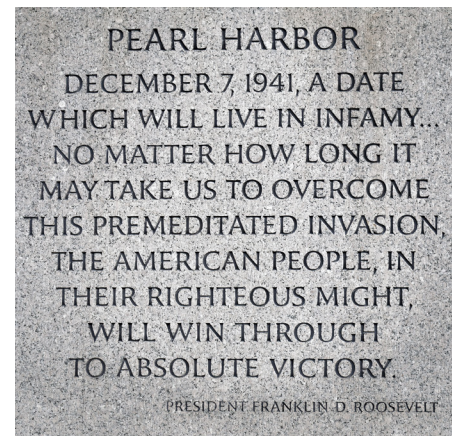

It is one of four memorials on the Tidal Basin.

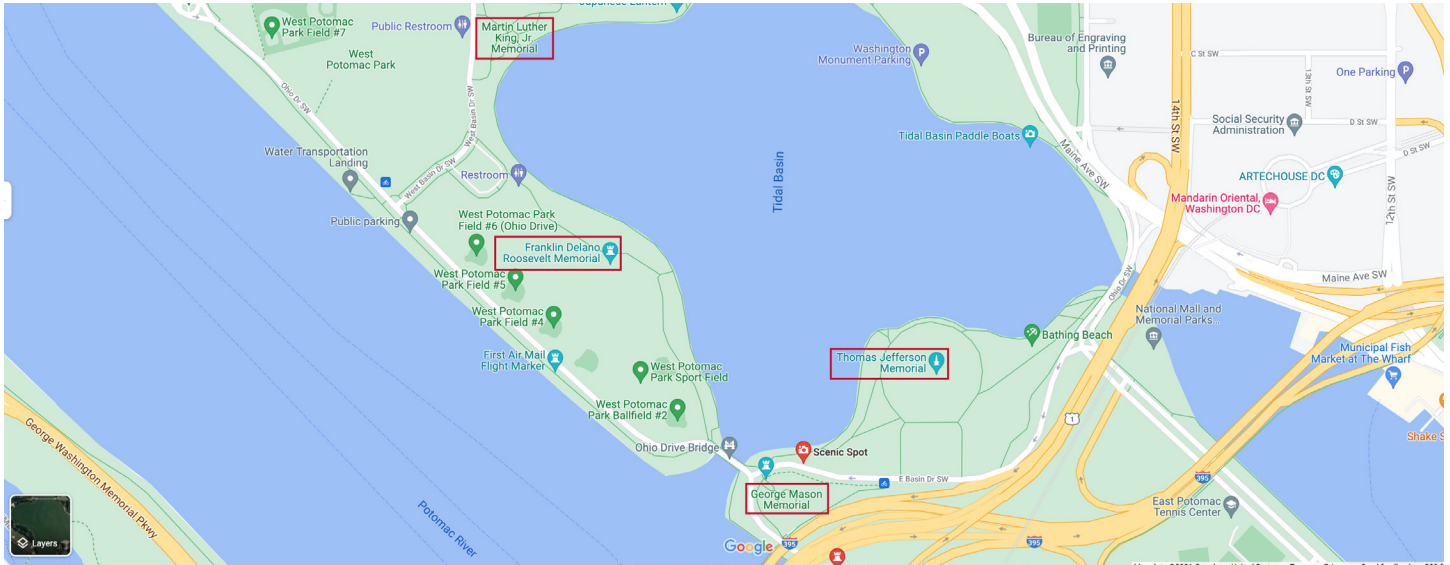
